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

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

Growing up Derek Black never thought to question his family's belief in white nationalism. It seemed as though white supremacy was an inherent truth. Then he went to college. At the New College of Florida, Derek lives a double-life: secretly broadcasting his views on his morning radio show, but never in the classroom. When a classmate uncovers his identity, Derek soon faces backlash from the campus, forcing him to face the ugliness of his beliefs for the first time. Derek's classmates struggle to find the best way to handle the news, with many protesting his presence on campus. Other students find the courage to reach out to him, including an Orthodox Jew who invites Derek to attend weekly Shabbat dinners. Through those dinners-and the conversations shared at the table-Derek's classmates help him understand new perspectives, giving hope that hatred can be unlearned.

ELI SASLOW is a staff writer for The Washington Post and a contributor to ESPN The Magazine. He has won a Pulitzer Prize for explanatory reporting and a George Polk Award for national reporting, and has been a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize in feature writing. His works include Ten Letters: The Stories Americans Tell Their President and American Hunger: The Pulitzer Prize-Winning Washington Post Series. He lives in Oregon with his wife and two daughters.



Easy to grow, sustainable, and a solution to climate change, ocean vegetables are plentiful, nutritious, and delicious. In *EAT LIKE A FISH*, Bren Smith—former commercial fisherman turned restorative ocean farmer—shares a bold new vision for the future of food. He encourages students to reimagine their ideas about ocean eating, while taking them on a journey from his childhood in Newfoundland to his early years on the high seas, from pioneering new forms of ocean farming to surfing the frontiers of the food movement.

Written with the humor and swagger of a fisherman telling a late-night tale, this is a monumental work of memoir-turned-food policy that will change the way students think about what they eat, and inspire them to find creative ways to make their impact on the world.

BREN SMITH is a former commercial fisherman turned ocean farmer who pioneered the development of restorative 3D ocean farming. Born and raised in Newfoundland, he left high

school at the age of 14 to work on fishing boats from the Grand Banks to the Bering Sea. His writing has appeared in *The New York Times, National Geographic*, and elsewhere; his ocean farm won the Buckminster Fuller Challenge for ecological design, and, in 2017, was named one of *Time* magazine's Best Inventions. He is the owner of Thimble Island Ocean Farm, and Executive Director of the non-profit Greenwave.

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



THE MONK OF MOKHA is a heart-pounding true story of a young man struggling to find a balance between his family heritage and his pursuit of the American dream.

Mokhtar Alkhanshali grew up in San Francisco, one of seven siblings brought up by Yemeni immigrants in a tiny apartment. At twenty-four, unable to pay for college, he works as a doorman until a chance encounter awakens his interest in coffee and its rich history in Yemen. He leaves San Francisco and travels deep into his ancestral homeland to tour terraced farms high in the country's rugged mountains and meet beleagured but determined farmers. But when war engulfs the country and Saudi bombs rain down, Mokhtar has to find a way out of Yemen without sacrificing his dreams or abandoning his people.

DAVE EGGERS is the author of twelve books, including A Hologram for the King, finalist for the National Book Award; and What Is the What, finalist for the National Book Critics Circle

Award and winner of France's Prix Médicis Etranger. He is the founder of McSweeney's and the co-founder of 826 Valencia, a youth writing center that has inspired similar programs around the world, and of Scholar-Match, which connects donors with students to make college accessible. He is the winner of the Dayton Literary Peace Prize and is the co-founder of Voice of Witness, a book series that illuminates human rights crises through oral history.



Growing up in Somalia, Abdi Nor Iftin first fell in love with America from afar. As a child, he learned English by listening to American pop and watching action films starring Arnold Schwarzenegger—hoping for the day the Americans would come and defeat the warlords like the heroes in his favorite movies.

Sporting American clothes and dance moves, he became known around Mogadishu as Abdi American. But when the radical Islamist group al-Shabaab rose to power in 2006, it became dangerous to celebrate Western culture. Desperate to make a living, Abdi used his language skills to post secret dispatches, which found an audience of worldwide listeners on NPR and the BBC.

In an amazing stroke of luck, Abdi won entrance to the U.S. in the annual visa lottery, though his route to America did not come easily. In Abdi's memoir *CALL ME AMERICAN*, his stories serve as a vivid reminder of why America still beckons to those looking to make a better life.

"In the night I brush / my teeth with a razor," he tells us, in one of the collection's piercing two-line poems. Young captures the strange silence of bereavement: "Not the storm / but the calm / that slays me." But the poet acknowledges, even celebrates, life's passages, his loss transformed and tempered in a sequence describing the birth of his son: in "Crowning," he delivers what is surely one of the most powerful birth poems written by a man, describing "her face / full of fire, then groaning your face / out like a flower, bloodbloom, / crocused into air." Ending this book of birth and grief, the gorgeous title sequence brings acceptance, asking "What good /are wishes if they aren't / used up?" while understanding "How to listen / to what's gone."


